2021 Furniture Program Conservation/Restoration Activity - Furniture Conservators, Dawn Hickmon and Lana Gabel

- All repairs and restorations of Capitol Original Furniture are documented and photographed. Physical reports are created and stored in Furniture shop files for reference and are entered into a digital Past Perfect program file for archival use.
- Ongoing computer skills training, upgrading skills to improve efficiency and productivity, and learning the history of Capitol.
- Yearly audit of Capitol Original Furniture in the State Government Executive branch offices completed.
- Continued inventory and information process training in Past Perfect Program which tracks Capitol Original Furniture (C.O.F.)
- Continued research and implementation of traditional upholstery methods enhancing staff skills and saving money through in-house upholstery work
- Continued research on Heywood Wakefield history and products to aid in restoration of the Judicial branch's original Heywood Wakefield rattan furniture
- HVAC Project Removal of all construction area window blinds for cleaning, restoration and repair. Reinstalled when window restoration/installation was complete.
- HVAC Phase 2 reinstalled 118 window blinds and 21 drapery rods and 21 sets of drapes
- HVAC Phase 3 removed and stored 161 window blinds
- Remove, modify design and reinstall the 3 large arch window blinds in the Law Library
- Furniture Repaired, Conserved, restored or re-upholstered

HVAC Project Support

Office of the Capitol Commission staff remove and reinstall Capitol original components during the HVAC Replacement project. OCC staff returned the original equipment to service in the mailroom after the completion of the HVAC Phase 2 work in the southeast quadrant. The Nebraska State Capitol's mailroom is once again functioning with the original mail boxes, restored counter windows and a replicated walnut counter.

They worked in and out of the mailroom to position the heavy structure. Right, once both sections were in place, drawers were returned and the entire bronze face cleaned.



The mailroom's original walnut counter had been replaced with a laminate surface. Below, carpenter Marshall recreated the counter; left, walnut slabs glued together and right, shaped in preparation for the final protective finish. Right the new walnut counter and fully operational windows enhance the appearance and function of the space.





The HVAC Project has provided the Office of the Capitol Commission opportunities to repair and restore original components of the building fabric that they could not do in their normal day to day operations. With the Secretary of State's office vacated, staff was able to refinish the floor and touch up scratches and damage to the wainscoting from 90 years of continuous use. Caring for the building is an ongoing part of the historic preservation mission staff is dedicated to fulfill. Their work ensures the Secretary of State's office is in good condition and ready to serve elected officials for the next 100 years.



After HVAC contractors vacated the space, OCC staff took over and restored the room's finishes. Above, Steve Janssen touches up scratches in the cabinet enclosing the heating and cooling element in the room.



After the trim had been restored, staining and refinishing the floor took over staff's time. Once the original scratched and faded floor finish was removed, Steve Janssen and Mike Marshall worked as a team to put down new stain, below left. Center and right below, Janssen applied the final finish to the floor. Working from an adjacent room, he backed himself out of the room. Once the finish was dry, a rug was put down and the Secretary of State's furniture installed to await his return to the office.

Office of the Capitol Commission staff routinely care for the surfaces and finishes in the Legislative Hearing Rooms. As part of the HVAC project, hearing rooms are cleared to make way for the upgrade. The large custom built circular committee desks remained in place under protection. Once the HVAC work was done and the desks uncovered OCC carpenter Mike Marshall and finisher Steve Janssen did more extensive repair and refinishing of the desk surface.

Right, during the HVAC project permanent fixtures unable to be moved, the committee desk and artwork, were protected.

Once contractors removed the protection, carpet was installed, walnut doors were reinstalled, draperies hung, and the desks and audience seating returned to their usual location.

Window Work

The efficiency of the new geothermal system being installed in the HVAC Project depends upon windows in the Capitol being air tight and functioning properly. To that end, contractors are removing, repairing, repainting and reglazing windows throughout the building. While the windows on the east pavillion were being repaired, the Office of the Capitol Commission's machinist John MacKichan repaired and restored the window grills decorating the





Left, the window and grille before repairs. The steel window had rusted and would not close tightly. The exterior grille finish was faded and the grille loose in the enclosure. Right, the repaired window, repainted, reglazed and operational. The repatinated grille matches the window color and is securely installed.

Dome Project Support


Karen Wagner, the Office of the Capitol Commission's archivist, provided valuable background information to Matt Hansen, Capitol Preservation Architect, and the contractors working to waterproof and restore the tile on the gold dome of the Nebraska State Capitol. Searching the archives Wagner found photos of the original dome construction, these images illuminated the layers used in the dome construction and allowed the contractors to understand what they uncovered as they began the project.



Below, detail of the dome and sprayed gunite. The concrete gunite was scored while wet to provide grip for the setting bed layer.

The basic structure of the dome is Guastavino tile, which was covered with a water proof bitumen membrane, left, and a wire mesh frame to hold a sprayed on gunite concrete layer, pictured above.


> Right, as the contractors removed the setting bed damaged by water infiltration, they uncovered the original scoring and identified the tile's

Capitol Custodial

-Five nights/week, 52 weeks/year OCC custodial staff cleans 70,000 sq. ft. of Capitol Preservation space, corridors and stairs. OCC oversees Hartland Services, our contract custodial services team in cleaning an additional 195,000 sq. ft. of adaptive use office space daily.

-OCC cleans carpet in the Capitol and does specialty cleaning of exotic stone and wood finishes in all preservation spaces

-OCC staff manages recycling duties in the Capitol, paper, cardboard, plastic and aluminum recycling annually. Approximately 10 tons of cardboard, 60 tons of office paper, 10 tons of newsprint, 2 tons of magazines, 6 tons of mixed paper and approximately half a ton each of aluminum and plastic

-OCC staff has all floor cleaning duties and works with the contractor to clean, strip, refinish, and restore the unique floors and finishes in the Capitol. Staff continues the floor renovation program which will eventually strip 20- 30 years of old finish and apply new finish to all perimeter stone floors on first and second floors

-OCC custodial staff continues to be involved with event setups

-Continued COVID19 disinfection routine to promote staff and public safety in the Capitol, including more frequent high touch surfaces (doors and entrances) in public areas

-Upon completion of contactor work in HVAC project areas, custodial staff will clean areas to ready them for occupancy


Supreme Court Floor Refinished


After the mechanical systems upgrades made during Phase 2 of the HVAC project were completed, the OCC staff moved into the Supreme Court Chamber. Staff took advantage of summer recess when the courtroom was unused to clean and repair components of the room quickly and efficiently. Custodial staff took advantage of the opportunity to strip and refinish the entire marble floor while the furniture staff stained and touched up scratches and damage on the audience benches and the judges' bench.



Left, after protecting the base of the judges' bench, the Richard Mallam, custodial leader, was able to use power equipment to strip the floor finish, rather than using a more time consuming hand-stripping process.

Below left, because staff had to continue with the routine nightly floor work, the floor was stripped and refinished in two phases. The phased timing also allowed the furniture staff the opportunity to get their touchup work done before the entire floor was finished.





Left, Supreme Court Chamber floor comparison, inside the rectangle the marble tiles are dull and lack the beauty of the tiles with a fresh layer of wax. The wax enhances the beauty and protects the stone from daily wear, extending its life by hundreds of years. Above and inset, another comparison of the unfinished, inset, versus finished floor in the court.

Pump Replacement

The Capitol Commission's plumber and electrician worked together to replace the pump providing water to the irrigation system in the northwest quadrant of the Capitol's grounds.






